

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Reindeer

We have all heard stories of Santa and his magical reindeer. But did you know that these special deer are real animals? These beautiful, helpful creatures love cold weather and have an unusual diet.

Reindeer look different from other kinds of deer. Unlike most kinds of deer, both male and female reindeer have antlers! Male reindeer have very long, branched antlers. Female reindeer have shorter antlers. Reindeer have short, strong legs and have a short brownish coat. Their coat gets darker in the winter and lighter in the summer. They have long shaggy white fur under their necks, around their tails and over their hoofs. The male reindeer, called a **stag**, is about six feet long and three feet high at the shoulder. The female, called a **doe**, is a bit smaller. They have large hooves that help them walk in ice and snow.

Reindeer have always lived in the coldest parts of Northern Europe and Asia. In Norway and Sweden, reindeer have been trained to wear harnesses and pull sleds. Because reindeer were so helpful to the people of Norway and Sweden, they were brought to Alaska in 1887. These Alaskan reindeer are called *caribou*.

What can these cold-weather animals find to eat? They eat all kinds of vegetation. They find dry grass and leaves, tender moss and a cold weather plant called lichen that grows on rocks and frozen ground. The reindeer use their antlers and hooves to scrape snow and ice away from their food.

For hundreds of years, reindeer have been important to the people in these cold places. They take people from place to place by pulling sleds. They also provide people with milk and meat to keep them healthy and strong. Their furry skins are used to make warm clothing and boots.

The next time you read or sing a holiday song about reindeer, imagine what reindeer actually look like and where they live, what they eat, and how they help people. You will know quite a lot about these interesting creatures!

Native American Games



There are some things that all people have in common. One thing is that people everywhere like to have fun! No matter where you live, people like to play games! The Native American people played many interesting games. How did the games of the Native Americans differ from the games we play?

Since Native Americans are close to nature, it is not surprising that they "borrowed" toys from the woodlands. Long ago, there were no plastic toys or toys made in factories. All of the toys were made by hand from things found in nature. They used wood from trees, bits of bone, shells, stones, plants, and clay to make toys. This makes sense because there were no department stores nearby where you could go and simply buy a toy or game! Since nowadays we spend less time in nature, it makes sense that most of our toys are store bought, rather than made from natural materials.

Still, many of the games Native Americans played were like games we play today! They'd toss small stones or nuts into a basket or a hole in a tree. Doesn't that sound a little like basketball? Another game used a ball of deer hair wrapped in deer hide that was knocked around with long sticks. That game is a little like hockey! Just like many of our sports today, these games required practice and skill.

People in all cultures sometimes like to play alone. Native Americans used hummers, made of bone or wood buttons on a string. The player would wind it up and let it go, making a buzzing, humming sound. Tops were made from wood and clay. Toss and catch toys were made from pointed sticks or bones, with string or gut attached to a ball or cup. The object of this game was to toss the object onto the pointed stick. Dolls were made from leather or corn husks. Nowadays we have modern versions of these toys. But we have much more. Video games were not available to the Native Americans of yesterday. We also have interactive, electronic toys for all ages that can be played alone.

There are other games that can be played without any toys at all! Native Americans played games like tag and held relay races. Hide and seek was another favorite. These games are still enjoyed by children today - all over the world!

Whether made from nature or bought in a store, we share many games with the Native Americans of yesterday. Playing alone or together, with or without toys, everyone loves to play!

The Desert Habitat



Saguaro cactus reach toward the sky. Lizards bask in the baking sun. Red cliffs rise from the shifting sand. The landscape, climate, and wildlife make the desert a most remarkable habitat.

The desert landscape is unique and beautiful. Since there is little water, there are few trees and plants. However, you can find at least 100 varieties of cactus dotting the horizon, some with thorns, others with bright flowers and fruit. I have a cactus plant on my windowsill at home. Interesting red rock formations have been carved into the desert cliffs by centuries of hot desert wind. The contrast of golden sand and turquoise blue sand can take your breath away.

The climate in this environment is harsh. The temperature ranges from 20 degrees in the evening to 120 degrees during the day. There is very little rainfall. In fact, there is less rainfall in the desert than anywhere else on earth--as little as an inch a year! In Connecticut, we get quite a bit of rain. The air is very dry in the desert and wind storms are common. It can also snow in the desert, but usually during the coldest winter nights. Clearly, only the hardiest of people, animals, and plants can survive in this challenging place.

If you enjoy wildlife you will find an interesting variety in the desert! The sleek kit fox and comical prairie dog spend a lot of time underground. Colorful lizards and slithery snakes live under rocks and in hollowed-out cactus. There are many varieties of birds--dwarf owls, Gila woodpeckers and road runners among them. The road runner cartoon is my favorite. Naturalist Dr. Bill Smith says, "From scorpions to tarantulas, rattlesnakes to tortoises, you can find them all in the desert!"

So why not grab your camera, canteen, binoculars, and field guide and head to the desert? The unique scenery, wild weather, and amazing array of wildlife await you!

All About Eggs

You've all seen someone crack open an egg when cooking or baking. What is inside an egg? You've seen the yellow part and the clear part. But do you know the other important things about that egg that help a chick grow and hatch?

Let's look closely at everything inside an egg. The thick clear liquid part is called the white or albumin. The yellow part is called the yolk. I like eating the yolk when I have sunnyside-up eggs. There is also a thin white skin or lining called the shell membrane. At the wider end of the egg there is an air space. There may also be a small white spot on the yolk. This white spot could be the beginning of a chick!

If a fertilized egg is kept warm, many changes will take place inside the shell. The white spot will get bigger and bigger. It becomes a group of cells that will multiply and grow into a chick. This group of cells is called the embryo. Soon the chick's head and body start to form. The heart, blood vessels, eyes, wings, and legs take shape. A clear pouch called the amniotic sac surrounds and protects the embryo. Soon feathers appear. I have a colorful collection of feathers from all kinds of birds.

In three weeks, the chick will hatch! Hatching takes a lot of work for the chick. They must stretch and move against the hard shell. They use something called an egg tooth to make a crack in the shell. The egg tooth isn't really a tooth. It is a pointy part of their beak. I broke a tooth once on a piece of hard candy. The shell quivers and breaks open a little at a time. Hours later the chick emerges, all wet and very tired.

Soon the chick will grow into a hen or a rooster and the cycle - from the simplest cell inside the shell, to an embryo, to a newly hatched chick - will begin again. So what do you think comes first--the chicken or the egg?

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It's a sunny, warm afternoon and you're heading to the shore for an afternoon of fun. If you plan ahead, you can build a sandcastle! You'll need some simple equipment, the perfect site, and a lot of imagination! In just a few easy steps, you can become an expert sandcastle designer!

Be sure to bring along all of the equipment you'll need. Several sand pails or buckets of various sizes are necessary as forms or molds for your structure. You'll also need these to haul water to your site. Most sand castle architects prefer a plastic shovel, but an old tablespoon or scoop work just as well for shoveling moist sand into the buckets. For those little extra touches, bring along some interesting kitchen containers - rectangular plastic storage boxes, extra large rounded measuring spoons or cups, or cylinder-shaped tin cans left over from yesterday's soup or tuna fish to make interesting shapes.

When you arrive at the beach, you must choose a site for your build. Is the tide low or high? Is the tide coming in or out? Choose a site that is not too far from the water, and a place that will be safe from waves for at least an hour or two. But be careful for a firm foundation, the sand on your site should be moist, not dry and dusty. You'll also want to avoid a spot where bathers will run. Stay out of the path to the snack bar and the restrooms! You don't want your creation flattened or kicked into total destruction!

Now it's time to begin construction. Level the sand where you'd like your castle to stand. Next, shovel your largest bucket full of moist sand and pack it down. Carefully invert the bucket, holding the open end close to the level ground. Once the bucket is resting bottom up on the ground, gently lift it. What will remain is your first molded section of sandcastle! Smooth it with your hands and go on to the next section. Use the various sized buckets and containers to add sections and towers and turrets. Once you have the basic castle design complete, begin searching for decorative elements interesting scallop or clam shells, smooth round stones and pieces of worn, smooth seaglass. These become walls, doors, windows, and ledges. Make a fence of hollow rounded reeds and sea grass. Seaweed can be placed around the edges for landscaping. Finally, dig a moat around the perimeter and a channel all the way down to the water. When a wave comes in, the water will rush forward, filling your moat!

So the next time you head for the beach, feeling creative, lug along your supplies, scope out the perfect site, and begin construction! You can be the King or Queen of your castle in no time at all!

Bears F

It's hard to believe that these large carnivorous, often ferocious relatives of the dog, raccoon, and panda are the inspiration for millions of cuddly, soft stuffed toys! There are many kinds of bears, living in numerous places around the globe. Their behavior and interesting appearance fascinate their human neighbors everywhere.

Many kinds of bears can be found in a wide variety of places, mostly in wild mountain, forest, and arctic areas. In fact, bears inhabit every continent except Africa, Antarctica, and Australia. The largest bear, the Kodiak, which weighs almost a ton, is found in the wilderness and wide open spaces of Alaska. The Kodiak is related to the Grizzly bear. Grizzly bears, with their dark fur edged in white, live in many areas of the United States and Canada. Brown bears, which are smaller than the Kodiak and the Grizzly, and the North American black bear (which isn't always black - but brown, white, golden, even bluish tinted!) also live in the U.S. and Canada. The coast of the Arctic Ocean is home to the distinctive white polar bear, so at home in the snow and ice. Asia is where the slow moving sloth bear is found, with its unique long snout, and the sun bear characterized by its short black fur with a "bib" of light-colored fur.

What do all of these bears have in common? They all belong to the family Ursidae. These large furry mammals have thick, weighty bodies and can stand upright. Their teeth are large and numerous, and although bears are carnivorous, they are equipped with teeth that grind and crush rather than tear. This is because they are unique among carnivores in that they eat vegetation as well! You can recognize most bears by their rather squared off snout, short, rounded ears, and

short stubby tail. They have feet similar to human feet - complete with a heel and a sole. In fact, bears' hind feet have five toes! Their long, curved, sharp claws are used to tear at food and to move nimbly - in some cases even climb trees!

Bears' behavior has always fascinated human beings. Some bears hibernate through the winter, doing without food, and entering a deep sleep state in which their metabolisms slow down dramatically. These large animals, which may appear somewhat clumsy and slow, are actually fairly fast runners. A mother bear may charge at any threat to her cubs, human or animal. In order to fuel their large bodies, bears must eat quite a lot. In addition to their diet of meat, bears will eat berries and fruit, as well as fish. They have been known to raid campsites, foraging through the trash for food scraps of any kind. Bears also love honey and have no problem batting down a bees' nest and swiping it with their claws, scooping out gobs of thick, sweet honey. They communicate through a complicated "marking" system in which they claw, gnaw, or chew at tree trunks as a means of warning other bears to stay clear of their territory.

If you ever find yourself camping in a National Park, or hiking in a nature preserve, keep your eyes open for a member of the Ursidae family. If you spot any type of bear, stay calm, and move quietly away. These beautiful, yet sometimes menacing beasts, and the habitats they live in certainly deserve our respect!



Learn To Play Guitar



For as long as you can remember, you listen to music and what you notice most, what excites you most, is the sound of the guitar. You've always thought that playing the guitar is something you'd be good at - you just feel it! So how do you go about becoming, not just a guitar-playing wanna-be, but a musician who can eventually play guitar professionally?

Before you do anything else, you need to get your hands on a guitar. Some people feel that they don't want to invest a lot of money in an instrument before they know whether or not they'll continue to play. You might borrow a guitar from a friend or family member - many times people have perfectly suitable musical instruments packed away in their closets or attics. Another excellent and cost effective option is instrument rental. Most reputable music shops have a number of economical rental plans - often times the amount you spend on rent can be applied toward an eventual purchase. Also, if you want to purchase an instrument, look at the classified ads. Be certain that the guitar you rent or buy is a name brand - a Gibson, Ovation, or Fender are excellent choices. Do your research ahead of time. Talk to guitarists for tips on brands to look for and music retailers to visit.

After you have an instrument, you need to find a teacher. While some people are self-taught, and while there are numerous helpful books available to teach yourself, nothing beats having a skilled professional lead you through the beginning stages and beyond. In this way, you learn basic musicianship, including music reading, chord structure, and solid technique. You also have the privilege of playing along with a seasoned, experienced musician. As you become skilled, your teacher also becomes a source of networking,

hooking you up with other musicians in order to form a band or ensemble. Finding a teacher involves doing a little homework. Talk to other musicians and ask them for references. If you don't know any other musicians, call a local university with a music program, or a reputable music shop. They can provide you with names. Meet your potential teacher before committing to lessons. See if there's a good personality match, and see if this teacher can offer you what you want. If your goal is to play jazz and the teacher's personal taste is rock or classical, you've got the wrong teacher. You may need to interview several teachers before finding the right one.

The next step is, by far, the most important. Practice. Practice. And practice some more. You could have the best instrument and the best teacher in the world, but if you don't practice, you won't become a guitarist. The key to practice is consistency. Set aside at least an hour a day, and find someplace to practice where there are no distractions. Move through your lesson carefully and mindfully. Listen and think. When something is difficult, stop, go back, think, and repeat the difficult section, slowly and deliberately. Some students record their lessons, and then play along with the tape. Others enjoy playing with CDs. This forces accuracy, promotes ear training, and moves you along toward the kind of confidence required to play with others. Keep in mind, that an experienced teacher will not only give you music that is fun - musical growth involves technique-building through daily exercises, scales, and chords. The more you challenge yourself and devote yourself to practice, the better you will become!

So you want to play guitar? Get yourself an instrument, find the right teacher, and get down to work. Practice makes perfect! And who knows - someday you may be on the road as a professional guitarist - or you may even take on some students of your own!

You've saved your money for years, dreaming of the day you'd put the key in the ignition of your very own car, turn the key, and step on the gas. You've done well, and now you have the money, you have the license, and all that's left to do is buy the car of your dreams. You've narrowed it down to two - an SUV or a sports car. What will you need to consider before you make up your mind?

For many people, it's all about style. A sports car definitely makes a statement it says the driver is adventurous, spontaneous, and fun. The sleek lines suggest sophistication and speed, and it is exciting sitting close to the ground - feeling nearly one with the road. You can imagine speeding along a shoreline road, wind in your hair, the music blasting. Still, the SUV makes a style statement of its own as well. Casual, outdoorsy, it suggests a rugged determination and a spirit of independence. Off road or on, sitting behind the wheel of an SUV makes you feel as though you can conquer the world.

Another consideration is size. If you're someone who can travel light, the sports car can work. Many sports cars are two seaters, so you have to be willing to limit your passengers to one! On the other hand, an SUV is typically large, roomy, with collapsible back seats for hauling gear of all kinds. Most SUVs can easily hold six passengers. If you're into road trips and drag along a lot of luggage, you'll need to get a luggage rack to compensate for the small trunk in the sports car. The SUV usually comes equipped with a luggage rack, and many are equipped to tow a trailer. This makes it easy to put your boat in the water or haul your jet-ski!

Nowadays, everyone is concerned with gas mileage. If you've chosen a smallish

sports car with a V4 or a V6 engine, you'll smile at the gas pumps. These perky little cars will stretch your fuel dollars far. SUVs are another story. True, you can get a V6, but these larger vehicles require more gas to run, and the larger V8 models are truly gas guzzlers. Without a doubt, the smaller sports cars (with the exception of the V8 high performance sports vehicles) are more economical from the standpoint of fuel.

Of course, everyone needs to think about safety. Here, the SUV comes out on top. The smaller sports cars are typically not as crash-resistant as their larger counterparts. Because of their size, they are often harder to see in a side or rear view mirror and can therefore become involved in accidents. Also, ask any insurance agent about insurance costs for sports cars and you'll see that, statistically, drivers of sports cars are less inhibited and tend to be risk-takers, which can result in a greater number of accidents. The SUV's size and weight, in addition to their 4 wheel drive features make these the more stable vehicle. One caution however - some SUV drivers develop a false sense of confidence in their vehicle's ability to travel through snow, ice, and rain. They tend to drive faster than conditions safely suggest, which can also result in accidents.

There are certainly many factors to weigh in making the sports car vs. SUV decision. Whatever you decide, take your time, do your research, and be sure to line up the style, size, economic, and safety features with your personality carefully before making this major purchase! Then go enjoy the open road!
